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What the Universities Say...

- The English Baccalaureate was introduced as a performance measure for schools in England in the 2010 performance tables. It is not a qualification.
- The English Baccalaureate includes academic subjects highly valued by the Russell Group but it is not currently required for entry to any Russell Group university. Some require a language for some courses.
- The subjects are considered to be the most facilitating A-level subjects for university entry.

YEAR 9 OPTIONS 2023 FORM

Subject choice

All students will be required to follow Examination courses in English, Maths and Science and Core non examination courses in RE, PE and PSHE (Personal Well Being) in accordance with the National Curriculum.

Students will then be able to choose **THREE** Examination courses in option subjects. **One from Group A, and two others from Groups A or B**. Students are also required to enter a reserve choice.

Key Stage 4 Option Choices.

To ensure a balanced curriculum all students must select at least one option from Option Block A in the table.

The remaining two option choices are an open selection by students from either Option Block A or B. A reserve option is required. Reserves may be used where it is appropriate.

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




In England, all young people must be in some form of education or training until they are 18.

Post 16 Options Overview



What do the 'levels' mean?

• Suitable for students with two GCSEs at grade 2

- Practical course
- Usually 1 year

Level 1

Level 2

Level 3

Level 4 +

• Suitable for students with 4+ GCSEs at grade 4, or who have completed a Level 1 course

- Equivalent of GCSE grade qualifications
- Practical courses, BTECs, Apprenticeships
- Usually 1 year courses

• Suitable for students with 5+ GCSEs at grade 5+, or who have completed a Level 2 course

- A Levels, BTEC, T-Levels, Apprenticeships
- 2 year courses

- Degree level and above
- Need to complete a Level 3 course first

A Levels

- Subject based
- Different courses have different entry requirements (usually grade 5+)
- Can lead to a degree
- Look at subjects library on Unifrog to look at degrees your subjects could lead to
- Exams at the end of 2 years
- A*-E

BTECs (Business & Technology Education Council)

• BTECs are amazing, versatile qualifications that open up doors in careers in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths), construction, business, law, sport, IT, beauty, the creative industries and more!

Did you know..?

- A large majority of BTEC students are employed full time after completing their qualification
- You can take BTECs and GCSEs/A-levels alongside one another (offered at some of our local colleges)
- BTECs are different to A-levels and GCSEs as they are taught through practical work and theory rather than just theory.
- Continual assessment throughout the course
- Pass, Merit, Distinction

Technical Qualifications (T Levels)

- New, government-backed career focused qualifications for 16-19 year olds
- Equivalent to 3 A-levels
- Two year course, with 45 day industry placement
- T-levels develop technical skills to prepare young people for the job market
- Backed by hundreds of British businesses who helped design them
- Range of courses business, education & childcare, engineering, catering, hairdressing & barbery, digital, legal.
- Mixture of ways of being assessed e.g. observations, portfolios.



Apprenticeships

- Learn and earn
- Different levels Traineeship (L1), Intermediate (L2 5 equivalent GCSEs), Advanced (L3 equivalent 2 A Levels), Higher (L4 Foundation degree), Degree apprenticeship (L6/7)
- Not just practical subjects e.g. business administration, teaching assistants.
- How do you get on one? Look out for vacancies eg. on Unifrog (continually updated), apply and impress the Employer
- They are very competitive so you need to be able to show you have 'the edge' i.e. examples and evidence of your skills/competencies
